AR 2990 Sp Tp: Landscape Painting

Analysis of space and organization of composition are just some of the challenges of the landscape painter. This course builds on the student's previously acquired painting skills in order to explore the visual culture of landscape traditions in both historical and contemporary contexts. On- and off-site assignments are intended to reflect student knowledge of practical demonstrations and illustrated lectures.

BU 2990 Organizational Behavior and Management

Organizational Behavior is the study of how individuals and groups behave at work. This course covers a range of topics connected to the improvement of how an organization can become more effective: motivation, leadership, conflict, organizational effectiveness, and others. Students will develop applied knowledge, skills, and tools to the analysis of organizational challenges and will evaluate solutions to specific cases. Students will also identify and develop interpersonal and leadership skills that will help them advance in their professional paths. Credits: 4

CO 1110 Oral Communication

This course introduces students to the theories and principles of oral communication by focusing on effective public speaking and listening. Students learn to select and research topics, organize information, choose appropriate oral and nonverbal language, and orally present ideas to classmates.

CO 3990 Topics in Communication Studies: Intro to Mass Media

The mass media are so pervasive in contemporary society that students in many disciplines will find this course valuable. Intro to Mass Media provides a comprehensive overview of the development of such media as newspapers, magazines, books, radio, television, film, recordings, and the Internet. We also study and analyze: the convergence of traditional media with the digital world; the importance of being media literate and understanding/using media grammar; media bias; the rise and impact of social media; media theory and research; and interactive media (video games and virtual reality). In addition, this course introduces students to issues of regulatory control, audience analysis, media ethics, and international mass communications.

CO 3990 Topics in Communication Studies: Media Literacy

Teaches the ability to analyze and evaluate information received from the media. Students will deconstruct media content--photographs, newspaper articles, advertisements, tv shows, movies, documentaries, and develop an understanding of how media influences us and how we in turn can influence others. This class will allow you to think more strongly about the media and how they impact you as a consumer, creator, and member of a democracy.

LAS 1990 Permaculture Practice: Summer Garden

This course emphasizes bed preparation, planting from seeds and transplanting, plant care, weed management and protection from weather, pests, animals and pathogens. Emphasis is on using the approved organic methods. (Offered in Summer I, 4 credits)

LAS 1990 Permaculture Practice: Harvesting and Marketing

This course focuses on harvesting the vegetables and flowers for specific markets such as NEC dining services, local restaurants, farmers markets, as well as individuals on campus and look for suitable marketing strategies in order to make value-added sales. (Offered in Summer II, 4 credits)

LAS 1110 Ethics and Capitalism

Capitalism has been a powerful force in shaping the world as we know it. But has the output been morally good or bad? How do we weigh the opportunity afforded through the free-market with the marginalization, oppression, and pervasive inequality within the distribution of primary social goods? This course examines that very question by first exploring a normative ethical framework, upon which, to evaluate morality. Capitalism and some related economic concepts will be defined and will serve as the focus of the moral evaluation. Related literature, historical events, political theory, recent organizational trends, and sociological phenomena will also be included within the evaluation.

LAS 1110 Nature Writing

Due to economic interests and technological advancements, we, as a society, have become more and more disconnected from the natural world, generation after generation. Yet, our love of nature and our understanding of our role within it lives on in our literature. In this course, students will spend time outside, amongst nature, to connect with that world and write about the stories nature provides them. Students will also read a wide variety of examples of American nature writing to examine how other authors have vividly conveyed the details, patterns, and human meaning of the natural world.

Using what they learned from those readings, students will refine their skills in analyzing and writing. As we experience and write about nature, students will also be asked to think about how we have engaged with nature—historically, scientifically, philosophically, mythologically—and how that engagement has evolved over time.

LAS 3110 When Democracy Fails

Working with the philosophical frameworks of Plato, Locke, Hobbs and Rousseau, this class will explore the fundamental elements of democratic theory and the strengths and weaknesses of democracy as a political ideal. Taking into account current struggles of people worldwide to establish democratic rule, a central question will be: once fought for and established, what are the issues that threaten democracy's survival? Examples of historical failures of democracy, i.e., Athens, and Germany before the Nazi takeover, will be investigated in relation to current political/social movements, in order to gain some insight into how/why democracies can fail.

PE 1990 Introduction to Dance

This course will provide students with an introduction to the various styles of dance. Some styles covered may include ballroom, creative movement, lyrical, jazz, tap, hip-hop, acro, and others per the request of the students. The course will be a great opportunity for someone who has always wanted to learn to dance or for someone who has danced in the past but would like to learn more. Students will also be able to use the movement as a coping mechanism for dealing with stress and anxiety. Experience is not required. Open to all students
