## **FALL 2022 COURSE DESCRIPTIONS NOT FOUND IN CATALOG**

### **AHT 2990 Women, Art, and Power**

This art history course will explore the nature of gendered representation in the history of art from the Renaissance to the present day. While the primary focus will be on the representation of women and the work of women artists, the construction of masculinity in the arts will also be addressed. Art will be examined in relation to its political, social, economic, and religious context to establish the broader implications of these visual documents. The course is organized thematically and will cover: the mother figure, self-representation, gender fluidity, Venus/Goddess archetype, object v. creator, and the feminist movement. The student will gain a broadly inclusive understanding of the art tradition as it pertains to women, sensitivity to gender issues, and sensitivity to the gendered nature of representation.

### **AHT 2990 The Genius of Michelangelo**

Michelangelo Buonarroti is arguably the most famous artist in the Western tradition. Proclaimed "divine" in his lifetime and admired (and feared) by followers and critics alike, the influence of his work and the impact of his "legend" have been almost boundless. In this course, we will examine the works of this master, considering how the artist's reputation was fashioned by a series of instantly famous "great works" including the David and the Sistine Chapel ceiling. In-class discussion of readings will explore the artist's rise to fame as well as how Michelangelo expanded upon and departed from the standards established by these earlier celebrated masterpieces.

### **AR 2990 Sp Tp: Intaglio Printmaking**

This course will be a survey of differing media that belong to the family of intaglio. The course will cover dry point, line etching, spray aquatint, soft ground, white ground, and sugar lift. Two-dimensional formal and conceptual issues, as well as multi-plate color processes, will be addressed.

### **AR 2990 Sp Tp: Relief in Printmaking**

This course covers traditional and non-traditional methods of relief printmaking. Multiblock color printing and reduction block printing will be introduced. Emphasis will be given to the unique graphic aesthetic of the Lino block/woodblock. Two-dimensional formal and conceptual issues along with contemporary and art historical issues will be explored.

### **AR 2990 Sp Tp: The Art of Promotion**

Self-promotion is vital when it comes to success for creative professionals. Topics explored in this interdisciplinary course will include storytelling through video, online social media presence, marketing material, and online portfolios. Learn to create your own dialog and get your work noticed as an artist in today's world.

### **CAR 2990 Sp Tp: Storyboarding**

The goal of this course is to develop the skills necessary to build dynamic environments while holding students to professional practice ideas. Students will develop a variety of interior and exterior settings, asset illustrations, and process drawings that will help convey compelling narratives in their illustration work for a variety of markets including, advertising, web, animation, and visual development. Students focusing on fundamentals of drawing, painting, and design principles to develop the method, process, and applied techniques utilized in two-dimensional visual arts, while employing linear and atmospheric perspective, use a variety of viewpoints such as bird's eye, worm's eye, etc., and build upon skills and styles already accomplished. Students will employ light and shadow to help develop dynamic compositions and use color to convey the time of day, season, mood, etc. Students will draw from a bank of collected references and will reference artists that use environment in a dynamic fashion. Projects will continue to emphasize on developing an efficient process while reinforcing conceptual thinking, ideation, thumbnails, sketches, value, drawing, color, and design skills. Class critiques will help create a network of other creatives to communicate with, learn from, and provide support, not only in class but outside of structured hours. There will be a balance of in-class working time and project tasks students will need to complete in between meeting sessions.

### **CAR 2990 Sp Tp: The Comic Strip**

The comic strip is a uniquely American art, providing an early visual storytelling medium well before movies and television. This course will provide students a brief history of the comic strips, and their characters and creators. Students will work within the many strip formats, from the 3 and 4 panel mainstream newspaper strips of the 20th century to more alternative forms that can be found in modern web comics. Projects in this course will include character development, joke writing and storytelling, and producing comics material on a regular schedule. Students will also be exposed to multiple markets for comics and submission practices for these markets.

### **CAR 3990 Sp Tp: Ink and Color**

Students will explore the history, tradition and artists of western ink art & colorization and its influence and application within the contemporary illustration field. Strong drawing, aesthetic applications, design principals and painting methods from editorial, comics and sequential art will be utilized while visually conveying provided and self-created content. The course will focus on traditional mediums (inks) for drawing and incorporate both traditional and digital methods for colorization.

**ILL 3990 Sp Tp: Children's Book**

Illustration Special Topics: Children's Books illustration will concentrate on the process of creating a children's picture book. The student will choose one of the six public domain stories offered and develop it into a 32 page narrative picture book—exploring character development, page layout, and composition as well as flow and continuity. Beginning with the storyboard, the student will create a thumbnail version of their story that will provide a guide as they develop the book dummy.

**ILL 3990 Sp Tp: Concept Art I**

Concept Art is one of the largest fields of illustration. This course will explore Concept Art techniques, which are primarily utilized in game, television, and film creation. Students will focus on creating multiple solutions to visual elements within an imagined environment. The thematic visual experience comprised of character; environment & architecture will be explored. Ample focus will be placed on the various stages of concept development, ranging from initial ideation and sketches to fully realized illustrations depicting a character or environment.

**ILL 3990 Topics: Advanced Illustration**

The conceptual illustrator is tasked with coming up with new ideas that translate into original, visual content. Students will create weekly illustrations within the provided themes. The idea counts more than the method when talking about conceptual illustration. The concept is what catches your attention first, though the way it's drawn matters too. Some illustrators start their creative problem-solving with a list of words when working on an assigned topic; others free associate, and some sketch out their ideas until one of their concepts stands out from the rest. Many conceptual illustrations rely upon a play on words or a visual pun, others combine two very different subjects we wouldn't usually think of together. The goal of great conceptual illustration is to make us think. An image that stops us in our tracks as we browse through articles and ads online or in a magazine, newspaper, or book, is what the best of conceptual illustration does. Keeping it simple is the goal; getting the message across, the number one concern.

**LAS 1110 Philosophy and the Natural Environment**

Philosophy and the Natural Environment is a beginning topical exploration into humanity and its complex relationship with Nature. Looking through the lens of three distinct periods in history, students will engage in analyzing the thought of some of the most pivotal thinkers in the history of philosophy. Time will be spent exploring Ancient society and its relationship with Nature focusing the Mesopotamian, Egyptian, Greek and Roman worlds. The course will then move into the Medieval Age exploring basic notions of Christian theology from both the Western and Eastern European mindsets. Following this study, students will then end the course with a study of the basic philosophical tenets of the Modern World and its relationship with Nature through the changing ideas of the Renaissance, Reformation, Scientific Revolution and the Age of Revolutions. Philosophy and the Natural World ultimately leads students to contemplate how various cultural

mindsets, religious beliefs and scientific findings have shaped each era's understanding of the unique relationship that humans have with Nature.

**LAS 1120 US Cllg Stdts: Agnts of Soc Chg**

This course will explore college students as agents of social change throughout the 20th century. Students will explore major social/racial/political movements including the Civil Rights Movement, Stonewall Riots, #MeToo, service to the communities after 9/11, and Black Lives Matter movement. In addition, students will reflect on their values and ethics as guiding principles for decision-making in their careers and service to communities while exploring the Declaration of Human Rights.
